Course Information

Description

This is a general survey course in Tennessee history from early statehood through the present with a focus on how this narrower history fits into a broader national narrative. We will focus on some specific people, events, and periods that helped to shape that story. We will explore narratives of state and local history through archives, exhibitions, and the built environment for a better understanding of how state and local history is preserved, interpreted, and shared to the public.

Objectives and Outcomes

The intended outcome is a better understanding of key historical events in Tennessee state history and how those events helped shape the state in which we live.

Assignments and Projects

History-in-Public Review and Reflections (3 total) 30%

- Summarize the assigned exhibition, historical site, archival collection, or walking tour activity.
- Analyze and discuss the narrative based on course readings.
- Conclude with critiques and suggestions.

The Girls of Atomic City Book Review 10%

- Summarize the book.
- Analyze and discuss the narrative and the historical methodology used.
- Reflect on how this book expanded your knowledge of TN history and the history of WWII.
- Conclude with new questions or topics for further research.

The Girls of Atomic City Book Discussion Activity 5%
