# **Description**

Students will explore issues relative to choices an individual and society make when utilizing 'free time' and resources. Critical thinking will increase understanding of how leisure impacts our personal and collective lives. Students will explore factors relative to health, well-being, social flourishing, constraints, equity, diversity, multiculturalism, and communities.

# **Objectives**

At the conclusion of the course, you should be able to:

- 1. Explain issues/problems, select and use evidence, consider context and assumptions, and represent their position and conclusions logically and effectively relative to leisure.
- 2. Interpret & describe the meanings of leisure in relation to human development, anthropology, popular culture, and society.
- 3. Critically reflect on various constraints to full-participation in leisure, including the positive and negative impacts of play and recreation..
- 4. Interpret issues relative to leisure equity, diversity, and multiculturalism in relation to current and/or historical issues.
- 5. Analyze leisure's impact, influence, and trends across society, our own individual lives, and our relationships.
- 6. Negotiate real-world problems related to leisure through self-assessment, critical reflection, and analysis.

  context and assumptions of various topics.
- Learning Activities: These activities will expand your knowledge of course topics through reflection, independent research, creative activities, and experiential engagement with the information you are learning. Each assignment will have different requirements, so please pay close attention to the details within the individual Dropbox and module Content instructions.
- Module Quizzes: Module quizzes serve as intermittent evaluations of learning and objective
  achievement. Quizzes demonstrate your understanding of key topics, recall of facts and ideas,
  and application of what you are learning to various situations.
- **Final Presentation:** This True Blue Core Assessable Assignment will help you engage in critical thinking through a problem-solving experience focused on real-world issues relative to leisure that impact human society and social relationships.
